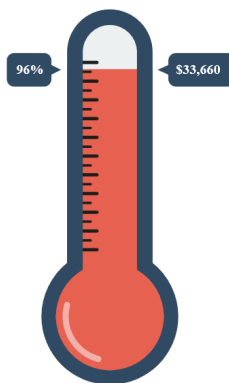

## For Your Life: Scott Hahn Reflects on the Twenty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

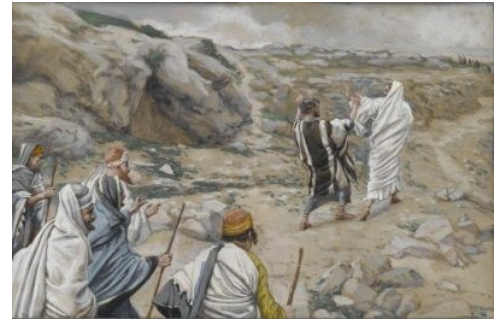
Readings:

[Jeremiah 20:7–9](#)

[Psalm 63:2–6, 8–9](#)

[Romans 12:1–2](#)

[Matthew 16:21–27](#)



Today's First Reading catches the prophet Jeremiah in a moment of weakness.

His intimate lamentation contains some of the strongest language of doubt found in the Bible. Following God's call, he feels abandoned. Preaching His Word has brought him only derision and reproach.

But God does not deceive—and Jeremiah knows this. God tests the just (see [Jeremiah 20:11–12](#)) and disciplines His children through their sufferings and trials (see [Hebrews 12:5–7](#)).

What Jeremiah learns is what Jesus states explicitly in today's Gospel. To follow Him is to take up a cross, to deny yourself—your priorities, preferences, and comforts. It is to be willing to give it all up, even life itself, for the sake of His Gospel. As Paul says in today's Epistle, we have to join ourselves to the Passion of Christ, to offer our bodies—our whole beings—as living sacrifices to God.

By His Cross, Jesus has shown us what Israel's sacrifices of animals were meant to teach: we owe to God all that we have.

God's kindness is a greater good than life itself, as we sing in today's Psalm. The only thanks we can offer is our spiritual worship, giving our lives to the service of His will (see [Hebrews 10:3–11](#); [Psalm 50:14, 23](#)).

Peter doesn't yet get this in today's Gospel. As it was for Jeremiah, the cross is a stumbling block for Peter (see [1 Corinthians 1:23](#)). This is our natural temptation, as well: to refuse to believe that our sufferings play a necessary part in God's plan.

That's how people think, Jesus tells us today. But we are called to the renewal of our minds—to think as God thinks, to will what He wills.

In the Mass, we once again offer ourselves as perfect and pleasing sacrifices of praise (see [Hebrews 13:15](#)). We bless Him as we live, confident that we will find our lives in losing them, that with the riches of His banquet our souls will be satisfied.

**WHAT IS THIS ALL ABOUT? KEEP READING EACH WEEK FOR WAYS YOU CAN PARTICIPATE IN THE EUCHARISTIC REVIVAL.. YOU ARE BEING INVITED.**

We all need revival. The root word itself—revive—means “to live again.” After the past four years, don’t you feel like you need to live again? The Eucharist is the privileged place where we go to be revived, the source and summit of life itself. Jesus Christ—who called people back to life (both physically and spiritually)—desires our revival and is making it happen. True revival is always the work of God. We can’t fake or manufacture it. But we can choose how we respond. Jesus is doing something new. Do you desire it? We don’t get to choose revival—we can only be open to it. Revival isn’t our work; it’s the work of the Holy Spirit, and it is happening constantly. Let that sink in. We stand on the brink of a significant moment for the Catholic Church in the United States. The Eucharistic Revival is a uniting movement, gathering up sparks and fanning them into flame throughout our country. You are a part of that moment. But revival is not just for this moment. It’s for every moment. Revival has been happening since Pentecost, when the disciples waited for the next step. It is true, revival is a corporate work—but it begins personally.

If you are reading this, it most likely means you desire revival for more than just you. You desire it for everyone. That’s how this becomes a movement and a wildfire that transforms our world. When we embody that renewal as it has taken place in us, and bring it to other people, we become missionaries. Please check out [www.eucharisticrevival.org](http://www.eucharisticrevival.org) for personal encounters to join such as the “Revival Spark Series.” We want to use this time to pray for revival and for the courage to invite others to encounter Jesus in the Eucharist so they can experience new life as well.

# Jesus and the Eucharist Study

Every parish across the country is invited to host the Jesus and the Eucharist study during the Year of Parish Revival. This seven-session series will immerse participants in the kerygmatic proclamation (Sessions 1–4) and unveil God's saving work in the Eucharist (Sessions 5–7).

Each session opens with an exhortation from a different bishop, followed by lectio divina prayer with scripture. The main lesson is drawn from content created by the Augustine Institute and will include personal testimonies from Catholics across the country. We will then transition into small group discussions. Each session will be 2 hours or less.

## BELOW IS AN OVERVIEW OF EACH SESSION:

### Session 1: What's Our Story?

The Bible is the story of God's love for us. He created us out of love, redeemed us by his love, and transforms us in his love.

### Session 2: Who Is Jesus?

Jesus is both God and man, therefore he reveals who God is in relation to us. Jesus asked Simon Peter, "Who do you say that I am?" (Matthew 16:15) He asks this same question of us: who do you say Jesus is?

### Session 3: Am I Saved?

Salvation is a gift from God through Jesus Christ that requires our "yes."

### Session 4: Why a Church?

Jesus didn't simply leave us a written message or instruction manual to follow. He gave us a living, dynamic Church where we encounter him personally and allow ourselves to be transformed into his likeness.

### Session 5: God Is With Us

God's presence in the Old Testament foreshadows the gift of the Eucharist, one of the seven sacraments of the Church. Jesus established the Eucharist to give us strength and accompany us at every moment of our earthly journey.

### Session 6: The Story of the Eucharist

The story of the Eucharist can be traced throughout Scripture. From Genesis to the present day, this session explores how the Cross is the new Tree of Life, and the Eucharist is its fruit.

### Session 7: Bread for the Journey

The Eucharist sustains us on our spiritual journey. Our participation at Mass through the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist is an offering of thanksgiving to God. We are then sent forth to share what we have received.
