Planning for Mission

In 2024, after a year-long visioning process, I wrote New Life Through the Tender Compassion of Our God, a Pastoral vision for our diocese. In it, I named the missionary moment through which we are living. We live in times that cry out for the proclamation of the Gospel – the Good News that only Jesus brings.

The signs are all around us. Violence and division grow in our culture. In the Diocese of Crookston, Sunday Mass attendance has dropped 30 percent in the past decade – from 14,600 to around 10,000. Most of those who left are young, and most who are baptized today will disaffiliate before adulthood. Many are never baptized at all. It used to be that if the parish offered Mass or religious education, people would come. Today, they won't –unless they are invited. We are living in missionary times.

This is why we have begun Planning for Mission. We want to fulfill the command Jesus gave us: "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations ... teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you." (Mt 28:19-20) The Church exists in northwest Minnesota so that families, friends and neighbors can become disciples of Jesus. Our parishes are not meant to be clubhouses but mission centers – places where we are formed as missionaries and then sent to invite others to share the life of God.

Pope Francis describes this missionary shift clearly: "I dream of a missionary impulse capable of transforming everything ... so that the Church's customs, ways of doing things, times and schedules, language and structures can be suitably channeled for the evangelization of today's world rather than for her self-preservation" (Evangelii Gaudium, 27).

To respond faithfully, will require change. We are currently set up for decline. We are not yet ready to shift our efforts to grow. If we want to become missionary, we must be willing to change our ways of doing things.

That is the purpose of Planning for Mission. The first step has already begun: Regional Leadership Summits to introduce parish leaders to the vision. Next comes deeper formation in the three principles guiding this process:

- 1) living as authentic disciples,
- 2) discerning God's call through prayer and
- 3) forming mission-centered parishes.

This coming spring and summer, every parishioner will be invited to prayer, discernment, and feedback sessions. This will not be brain-storming alone but a spiritual process of listening to Jesus together, asking him to teach us how to do our mission.

Jesus reminds us: "I am the vine, you are the branches. Whoever remains in me and I in him will bear much fruit." To fulfill his command, we must be rooted in him. Every meeting of ours will include time before the Blessed Sacrament. And, as Jesus says, the vine must be willing to be pruned – we will discern letting go of some things so that new life may grow.

Practically, this means asking questions like: How can parishes collaborate for vibrant youth ministry? How do we form small groups that invite people into deeper discipleship? How do we support our priests so they can evangelize without burning out? With fewer priests, when and where should we have Mass? How do we reach those who no longer come to church?

The early Church faced far greater obstacles than we do. Yet, empowered by the Holy Spirit from Pentecost, a small band of disciples converted the whole Roman Empire within three centuries. They did it not with programs but with witness: living intentional Christian lives, showing virtue and holiness, caring for the poor and even giving their lives as martyrs. The world was changed because they followed Christ wholeheartedly.

We are heirs of that same mission. Through the Sacraments, God's word and our lives of prayer, we share the very life of God. Death has been conquered. We have been given the power to overcome sin – and received hope of new life. Yet so many around us do not know the hope of Jesus or the treasures of his love in his Church.
